# Art-based research for Public Engagement: Qualitative research sound-scaping for the VCS

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The voluntary sector's work lives on in the voices of those working in and engaging with it. Mixed with poetry and sound, bits of conversations stream from the trees. Birdhouses and birdcages are designed to let the public know about what's going on in our own communities through its organisations... but it also lets us feel what's going on! Should these lines be blurred when dealing with impact-driven research and public engagement?

The installation is designed as soundboxes representing two types of stories: the "lark in the park" are the good news stories of the sector, and the "canary in the cage" warns of trouble (in the sector's mines). Findings include data from interviews and discussions with VCOs collected for the CSF 2018 project and a Brunel University project 2024 for the Hayes and Hillington area, the University's neighbourhood. Voices are curated into four themes and mixed with music, field recordings, and poetry (with a social conscience). These streaming soundscapes on a loop play from the trees in public spaces as people walk by.

The project is funded by Brunel University's Public Engagement Fund 2024. It is a continuation of an artist-based engagement with the Civil Society Futures 2018, an independent inquiry of the state of the sector in England.


